#### REPORT OF THE DIRECTORS

The directors submit their annual report together with the audited financial statements for the year ended 31 March 2018.

#### PRINCIPAL ACTIVITIES

The principal activities of the Company during the year were providing integrated youth services and training activities for young people.

#### **BUSINESS REVIEW**

#### **Background**

A Brief History

The Boys' Brigade, Hong Kong ("BBHK") was incorporated in Hong Kong as a company limited by guarantee. BBHK principally engages in the provision of integrated youth services and training for the youth.

BBHK was established in 1959. With a heritage dating back to 1883, The Boys' Brigade, its genesis, was founded by Sir William Alexander Smith in Glasgow as a well-known international Christian uniform organisation for the youth. Nowadays, The Boys' Brigade has become an international mission movement with its global presence in over 60 countries.

In Hong Kong, BBHK currently serves more than 14,000 members with more than 350 Companies from churches, secondary schools, primary schools, kindergartens and youth centres all over the territory. BBHK strives to provide teenagers and children with all-round training and helps them cultivate positive personality traits comprising patience, kindness, loyalty and faithfulness as well as the sense of commitment through regularly meeting of the Companies on Christian education, foot drills, skills training and award programmes .

#### Our Visions

Whole-Person Development: Being the training base for whole-person development in youths, we facilitate intercultural learning and exchanges among young people from local, overseas and mainland China.

Character Building: We emphasise the value on character development and devote to help youths to build positive core values.

Youth Integration with Community: We raise social awareness of the youth through community services and training so as to enrich their knowledge and enhance their willingness to take on social responsibilities.

Advocacy of Family Values: We promote the importance of harmony in families, care for their spiritual needs, and strengthen what it entails in a healthy family.

#### Our Mission

Help young people develop respectable values and build a good character based on Christian education and beliefs.

#### **Our Achievements**

Members are those boys and girls aged 3 or above who have joined our units under our uniformed group services. We have a continuous and stable increase in our membership over the years. At the end of 2017-18, we have a total of 357 units in Hong Kong with 14,683 memberships, representing an increase of 3.5% from last year.

In the past years, there was a bloom in the variations of training programmes and activities held by the five District Committees. Examples of training courses include Basic Non-Commissioned Officer ("BNCO") and Advance Non-Commission Officer ("ANCO"), badges training course for Company Section and leadership training camps for Junior Section. Various Brigader-based activities were organised, including drill competitions, basketball races and site visits. In addition, for Officer-based activities, such as Officers' fellowships, prayer meetings, retreats and workshops were also conducted. Meanwhile, the committee members teamed up with the Uniformed Group Division to visit companies and attend Enrolment Services for nearly 400 times.

Apart from the district-based programmes focused on training nature, programmes with other focal points such as community services, gospel activities, youth forum, family cohesion, environmental protection education, character-building, etc. were organised on the headquarters level in order to fulfill our visions and mission.

## **Key Stakeholder Relationships**

BBHK keeps our Companies and members well informed through our official website and distribution of timely electronic communications. We also maintain good relationship with our members through participation in our annual events, district held activities, committee meetings and Companies' visits.

BBHK is a member agency of the Community Chest and the Hong Kong Council of Social Service. We are also one of the uniformed youth organisations subvented by the Home Affairs Bureau. We maintain a good relationship with our key stakeholders through regular communications and annual reports.

BBHK is a caring employer which offers fair remuneration packages. We help our staff members to maintain high productivity, team spirit and morale, in addition to the provision of learning and development opportunities. We maintain a rapport with our employees through regular meetings and other informal communications.

#### **Principal Risks and Uncertainties**

Unresolved issues include insufficient office space for the Headquarters and facilities to accommodate over 14,000 members.

BBHK is a non-governmental organisation and hence not fully subvented by the government. Some of the income sources are derived from donations. Certain donation campaigns are carried out on an annual basis, for example, Flag Day, which are subject to application results.

Declines in youth participation to our events are partly due to the continuous decrease in youth population in Hong Kong. Meanwhile, it is not common for the youth nowadays to make commitments to non-leisure nature issues. Similarly, declining self-discipline in the young generations makes uniform group formation less attractive to them.

The Anchor House is a self-sustained social enterprise providing adventure training programmes to members, churches, corporations and the general public at the Noah's Ark. Safety issues and appropriate insurance coverage are of utmost importance and highlighted in various activities.

## **Environmental Policies and Performance**

BBHK has been adopting energy-saving approach, such as setting the temperature of air conditioning to 25.5°C, switching off light when not in use, to name a few. It encourages an eco-friendly workplace by saving paper (and saving trees) and encouraging electronic communication.

#### **Business Model**

The business of BBHK is a mixed mode of operations. Our uniformed Group Service is partially subvented by the government, whereas our School Social Work Service is fully subvented by the Lump Sum Grant arrangement under the Social Welfare Department. Our Professional Training Services and Mainland Professional Social Work Supervision Services are both self-financed operations together with donation income; a surplus of approximately HK\$3.3 million in 2017-18 was recorded. Our Character Nurturing Service and Waste Recovery Service are supported by designated funds from The Family Council, Commission on Youth, and The Environment & Conservation Fund. Apart from the above, BBHK also obtains other designated funding from the government and other bodies, including public and corporate donors.

Income of BBHK in 2017-18 included more than 20% from government recurrent subvention. Designated funding and income generated from the provision of training also reported a steady growth during the last 3 financial years, which accounted for 72% of our total income.

#### Increase in donation income:

BBHK successfully held Flag Day activities in 2017 that contributes the donation of approximately HK\$2,680,000 and significantly increased in donation income to be used for new headquarters projects.

Increase in surplus for the year:

- 1. Funding and programme income increased by 20%, respectively; and
- 2. Donation income soared by 176.84%.

#### **Future Development**

BBHK has been searching for venue for new Headquarters for future expansion and development. Leveraging with the exploration and collaboration with a church, we will further expand our community services in Kwun Tong to better serve our members and the general public. More professional training programmes will be jointly organised with local universities. Last but not least, being a mission-driven movement, we will continue to facilitate the ministry development in mainland China and Taiwan.

# INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT TO THE MEMBERS OF THE BOYS' BRIGADE, HONG KONG

#### **Opinion**

We have audited the financial statements of THE BOYS' BRIGADE, HONG KONG ("the Company") set out on pages 9 to 21, which comprise the statement of financial position as at 31 March 2018, and the income and expenditure account, statement of changes in equity and statement of cash flows for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies.

In our opinion, the financial statements give a true and fair/view of the financial position of the Company as at 31 March 2018, and of its financial performance and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with Hong Kong Financial Reporting Standards for Private Entities ("HKFRS for Private Entities") issued by the Hong Kong Institute of Certified Public Accountants ("HKICPA") and have been properly prepared in compliance with the Hong Kong Companies Ordinance.

#### Basis for opinion

In connection with our audit of the financial statements, our responsibility is to read the other information and, in doing so, consider whether the other information is materially inconsistent with the financial statements or our knowledge obtained in the audit or otherwise appears to be materially misstated. If, based on the work we have performed, we conclude that there is a material misstatement of this other information, we are required to report that fact. We have nothing to report in this regard.

Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

## NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2018

#### 1 GENERAL

The Company was incorporated in Hong Kong as a non-private company limited by guarantee and is engaged in provision of integrated youth service and training activities for young people. The Company's registered office and business address is located at Ground Floor, Block A, Lok Man Sun Chuen, To Kwa Wan, Kowloon, Hong Kong.

The Company is a member agency of the Community Chest and the Hong Kong Council of Social Service.

On 25 February 2009, the Company was approved by the Inland Revenue Department to be a charitable institution or trust of a public character, which is entitled to exemption from tax under Section 88 of the Inland Revenue Ordinance.

On 7 November 2012, the Company was approved by the Companies Registry to change its name from "The Boys' Brigade, Hong Kong Limited" to "The Boys' Brigade, Hong Kong" of having been granted a licence to dispense with the word "Limited" in Company name.

Under the provision of the Company's Memorandum and Articles of Association, the liability of the members is limited and every member shall, in the event of the Company being wound up, contribute such amount as may be required to meet the liabilities of the Company but not exceeding HK\$10 each.

#### 2 BASIS OF PREPARATION OF FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Hong Kong Financial Reporting Standards for Private Entities ("HKFRS for Private Entities") issued by the Hong Kong Institute of Certified Public Accountants ("HKICPA") and the requirements of the Hong Kong Companies Ordinance. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

#### 3 SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles in Hong Kong and with accounting standards issued by the HKICPA.

#### (a) Property, plant and equipment

Property, plant and equipment are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation and any accumulated impairment losses.

Depreciation is charged so as to allocate the cost of assets less their residual values over their estimated useful lives, using the straight-line method. The following annual rates are used for the depreciation of property, plant and equipment:-

Leasehold improvements - lower of lease term or 20%

Furniture and fixtures - 33 1/3% Electrical equipment - 33 1/3% Computer equipment - 33 1/3% Motor vehicle - 20%

#### 3 SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

#### (a) Property, plant and equipment (continued)

If there is an indication that there has been a significant change in the depreciation rate, useful life or residual value of an asset, the depreciation of that asset is revised prospectively to reflect the new expectations.

An asset's carrying amount is written down immediately to its recoverable amount if the asset's carrying amount is greater than its estimated recoverable amount.

## (b) Accounts and other receivables

Accounts and other receivables are recognised initially at the transaction price. They are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less provision for impairment. A provision for impairment of accounts and other receivables is established when there is objective evidence that the Company will not be able to collect all amounts due according to the original terms of the receivables.

#### (c) Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents includes cash on hand, demand deposits and other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less. Bank overdraft is shown within borrowings in current liabilities on the statement of financial position.

#### (d) Impairment of non-financial assets

At each reporting date, property, plant and equipment are reviewed to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have suffered an impairment loss. If there is an indication of possible impairment, the recoverable amount of any affected asset (or group of related assets) is estimated and compared with its carrying amount. If an estimated recoverable amount is lower, the carrying amount is reduced to its estimated recoverable amount, and an impairment loss is recognised immediately in profit or loss.

If an impairment loss subsequently reverses, the carrying amount of the asset (or group of related assets) is increased to the revised estimate of its recoverable amount, but not in excess of the amount that would have been determined had no impairment loss been recognised for the asset (or group of related assets) in prior years. A reversal of an impairment loss is recognised immediately in profit or loss.

## (e) Operating leases

Leases where substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership of assets remain with the leasing company are accounted for as operating leases. Rentals applicable to such operating leases are charged to profit or loss on a straight-line basis over the lease terms.

# NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2018

#### 3 SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

(f) Accounts and other payables

Accounts and other payables are recognised initially at the transaction price and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

#### (g) Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the Company has a present legal or constructive obligation as a result of past events, it is probable that an outflow of resources embodying economic benefits will be required to settle the obligation, and a reliable estimate of the amount of obligation can be made. Expenditures for which a provision has been recognised are charged against the related provision in the year in which the expenditures are incurred. Provisions are reviewed at each reporting date and adjusted to reflect the current best estimate. Where the Company expects a provision to be reimbursed, the reimbursement is recognised as a separate asset but only when the reimbursement is virtually certain.

#### (h) Income recognition

Funds received and donations and other income is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable and represents fee income. Income is recognised in profit or loss provided that it is probable that the economic benefits will flow to the Company and when the income and costs, if applicable, can be measured reliably, as follows:

- i) Government grants and subvention are recognised as income over the periods necessary to match them with related costs. Grants related to expense items are recognised in the same period in which those expenses are charged in the income and expenditure account and are deducted from the reporting related expense.
- ii) Funds received are recognised as income on receipt. Donations-in-kind received are not recorded and reflected in the financial statements as it is usually not practicable or possible to obtain or determine their precise fair value.
- Programme income is recognised in the period in which the relevant programme is completed.
- iv) Donation income is recognised as income upon receipt.
- v) Interest income from a financial asset is accrued on a time basis, by reference to the principal outstanding and at the effective interest rate applicable, which is the rate that exactly discounts estimated future cash receipts through the expected life of the financial asset to that asset's net carrying amount on initial recognition.

#### 3 SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

## (i) Employee benefits

Salaries, annual bonuses, paid annual leave, contributions to defined contribution retirement plans and the cost of non-monetary benefits are accrued in the year in which the associated services are rendered by employees. Where payment or settlement is deferred and the effect would be material, these amounts are stated at their present values.

The Company operates a Mandatory Provident Fund Scheme (the MPF scheme) under the Hong Kong Mandatory Provident Fund Schemes Ordinance for employees employed under the jurisdiction of the Hong Kong Employment Ordinance and not previously covered by the defined benefit retirement plan. The MPF scheme is a defined contribution retirement plan administered by independent trustees. Under the MPF scheme, the employer and its employees are each required to make compulsory contributions to the plan at 5% of the employees' relevant income, subject to a cap of monthly relevant income of HK\$30,000. Contributions to the plan vest immediately.

#### (j) Translation of foreign currencies

Items included in the financial statements are measured using the currency of the primary economic environment in which the Company operates ("the functional currency"). The financial statements are presented in Hong Kong dollars, which is the Company's functional and presentation currency.

Foreign currency transactions are translated into the functional currency using the exchange rates prevailing at the dates of the transactions. Foreign exchange gains and losses resulting from the settlement of such transactions and from the translation at year-end exchange rates of monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are recognised in profit or loss.

#### (k) Related parties

For the purpose of these financial statements, related party includes a person and entity as defined below:-

- i) a person or a close member of that person's family is related to the Company if that person is a member of the key management personnel of the Company.
- ii) a person or a close member of that person's family is related to the Company if that person has control over the Company or has joint control or significant influence over the Company or has significant voting power in it.

- (k) Related parties (continued)
  - the entity and the Company are members of the same group (which means that each parent, subsidiary and fellow subsidiary is related to the others).
  - iv) either entity is an associate or joint venture of the other entity (or of a member of a group of which the other entity is a member).
  - v) both entities are joint ventures of a third entity.
  - vi) either entity is a joint venture of a third entity and the other entity is an associate of the third entity.
  - vii) the entity is a post-employment benefit plan for the benefit of employees of either the Company or an entity related to the Company. If the reporting entity is itself such a plan, the sponsoring employers are also related to the plan.
  - viii) the entity is controlled or jointly controlled by a person identified in (i) and (ii).
  - ix) a person identified in (i) has significant voting power in the entity.
